
There was also a run-off election for president of the freshman class. The choice was between Gerald Bertolimi and Cliff Forrester. Cliff was the winner.

The Atlanta Symphony is offering a new type of discount to college students for all Friday evening and Sunday afternoon subscription concerts and Wednesday evening Chamber concerts at Symphony Hall.

With the purchase of a Student Discount Card for \$2, a student is entitled to purchase a pair of tickets in the least available location in the house one hour before the concert for just \$2 each on Friday nights or Sunday afternoons and \$1.50 each on Wednesday night. (Regular top prices are \$7 for Friday and Sunday, \$4.75 for Wednesdays.)

Symphony General Manager, William L. Denton, said, "We want to give students the most flexible plan possible and a ticket price that is competitive with the movies."

The Symphony Student Discount Card may be used beginning October 27, the first Sunday the orchestra will perform in Symphony Hall and for 36 other concerts at the beautiful new Hall in the Atlanta Memorial

Arts Center.

"I think the biggest advantage of the cards, other than the discount price is the location of the seats that will be available to the students." Mr. Denton added. "Rather than sitting in the back rows of the balcony they can sit in the most expensive orchestra seats for the same price they previously paid for balcony seats."

The Atlanta Symphony 1968-69 season covers 36 weeks from September through May. It is Robert Shaw's second year as conductor and will be the first for the orchestra in its new home on Peachtree at 15th

The symphony will continue the special concert for high school students also, in cooperation with the public schools and the neighborhood concerts at Emory University, Spelman College and Westminister Schools.
