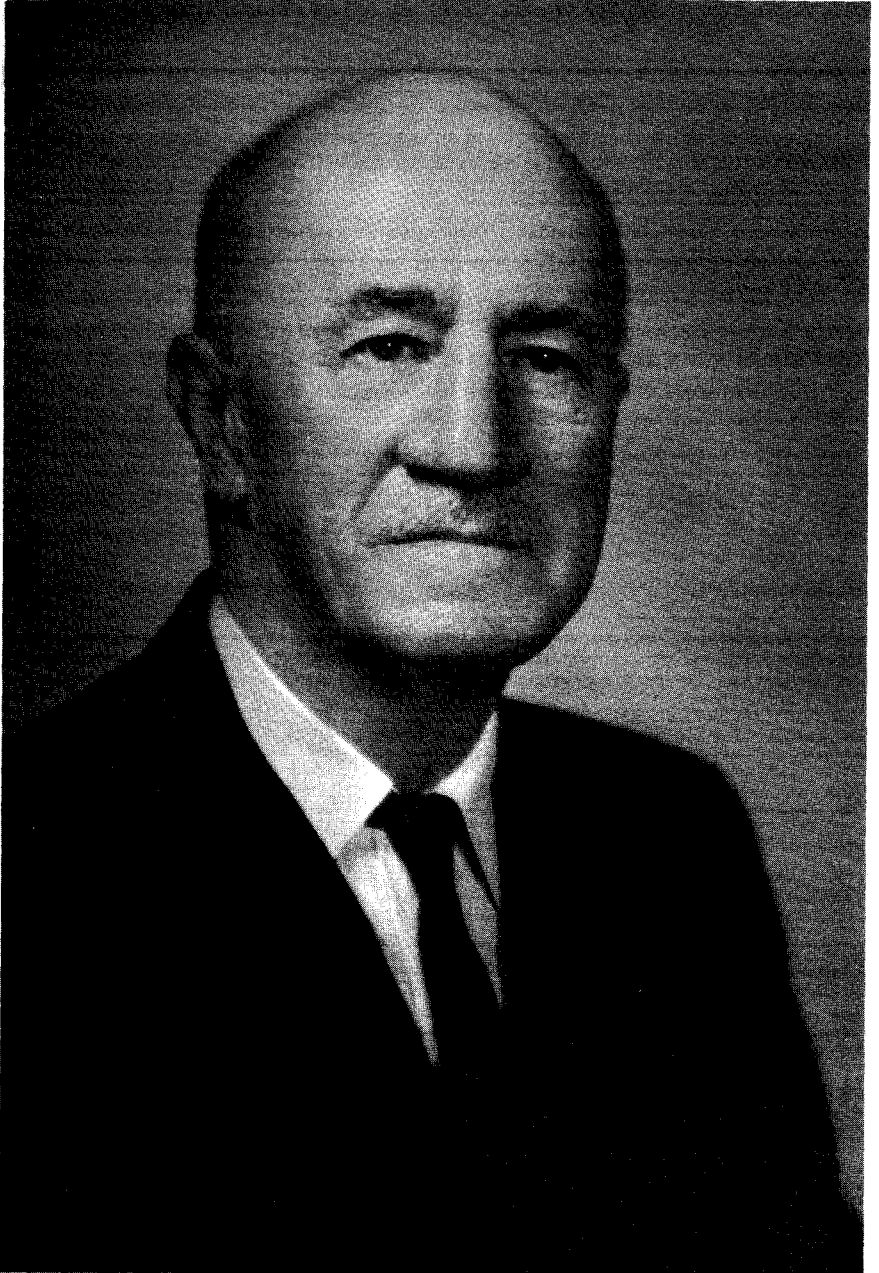

The Mercer Law Review wishes to acknowledge the appointment of the Honorable Bond Almand to the position of Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Georgia and takes this opportunity to introduce him to the Georgia Bench and Bar.

The career of Justice Almand has been one marked with honor and distinction. He was born on January 13, 1894 in Lithonia, Georgia. He received a Ph.B. degree from Emory University in 1913 and an LL.B. degree and an A.M. degree from Columbia University in 1916. After being admitted to the practice of law in Georgia in 1916, he served his country in World War I between 1917 and 1919 as a First Lieutenant in the Infantry with the 82nd and 9th Divisions of the United States Army. Upon completion of his military service, Chief Justice Almand was a successful practicing attorney until 1945, a member of the Georgia House of Representatives from 1935 to 1937, Solicitor of the Criminal Court of Fulton County from 1938 to 1942, Judge of the Fulton Superior Court from 1942 to 1949, Justice of the Supreme Court of Georgia from 1949 to 1966, and Presiding Justice of the Supreme Court of Georgia from 1966 to 1969.

Justice Almand thus brings to the high position of Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Georgia the experience and background which eminently qualify him for the position which he now holds. We, the Editors and Staff of the Mercer Law Review, wish him continued success as Chief Justice.
